






Phenology: The study of the timing of natural events, such as first leafing, first flowering, fruit ripening, first migrant birds seen, etc. particularly in relation to climate.





What were the main website changes?

Improved scientific data quality

- recording location from 6 mile radius to 20m radius ie pinpoint record on a map
- asked when last visited that location to improve accuracy of 'first seen' record

Safer personal data

 required existing users to re-register with the site with new, stronger passwords and verify they were 'human'




New website in July

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
Select location

- Too many changes in one go?
- But this was a once-in-a-decade chance to improve the project's data collection quality
- Expect a lot of comments and complaints even if done everything 'right' – this experience is common to all digital projects
- Drastically increase the amount of customer service time. Some people will need repeated, personal, handholding to make the transition, it's worth it!
